# YEAR 7 WELLBEING PROGRAMME

The well-being programme helps students build their confidence and self-esteem, develop skills to manage anxiety, and learn how to problem solve and promote emotional well-being. The students are encouraged to create a positive mindset to support them in making positive decisions in school and in their everyday lives. Students complete a 12 week programme which concludes with a presentation delivered to their peers and teachers.

During the presentation students showcased their understanding of wellbeing concepts, discussed key topics they've covered, and present their personal reflections on how the programme has helped with their confidence, self esteem and resilience.

## VALUES IN ACTION: ONLINE SAFETY

Over the Christmas break, young people may spend more time on their devices or online. There is advice included below to try and support with keeping children safe online.

# Keeping your child safe online



### What do I need to know?

Young people need help and guidance in navigating the online world safely. It can be an enriching and informative place to be but there are also risks that parents and carers should be aware of.

Your child may be gaming, socialising, searching and sharing online - all of which can be fun and a great way to relax and wind down after a day at school. However, there are also risks; being aware of these and talking to your child is an important first step in keeping them safe online.

There are a number of websites that can offer further advice and guidance to parents and carers, listed below.

### Socialising and Sharing

Things to be aware of:

- many social media apps have a minimum age of 13: Snapchat, Instagram, YouTube and TikTok. WhatsApp has an age requirement of 16;
- images can be shared online and can also be reshared by others. This can sometimes lead to online bullying. Check what your children are sharing online by checking their phone regularly, following their social media accounts or setting up 'mirroring' of their phone;
- it is not appropriate or even lawful to share images that are nude or semi nude. Talk to your child about protecting themselves and others by reporting requests for images or pressure from others; and
- it is unlawful to bully others online. This should be reported and users blocked.

### Gaming

Things to be aware of:

- age ratings of games are there as a guide of the content.Use these to help you work out if the game is appropriate for your child;
- messaging and contact functions. Ensure your child knows who they are talking to. They should never share their personal details online;
- trolling, griefing and scams. Your child may be tricked or scammed into giving up 'skins' or other in game items;
- bullying. Other gamers may be abusive or bully your child online. They can be blocked and reported. Check in with your child when they are playing.

### Searching

As a result of curiosity or by accident, children can be exposed to upsetting material online. This may be pornography, harmful websites promoting self harm or suicide or online platforms that can leave young people distressed or confused.

Things to be aware of:

- parental controls can be set up to prevent your child from accessing harmful material online such as pornographic material;
- not all information shared online is truthful. Sometimes it's hard for young people to tell the difference between fact and fiction; and
- computers provided by the school have a monitoring software on them called smoothwall. If your child has been accessing inappropriate material the school will contact you to discuss any support you may need.

### Parental Controls

- Parental controls are the names for a group of settings that put you in control of what content your child can see.
- Parental Controls and Privacy Settings are useful tools to help reduce the risks your children may face, but they are not 100% effective.
- Follow guides on website such as internet matters to help you set up Parental Controls.
- Always encourage them to talk to you about anything they find upsetting online.

### Top Tips!

- Have computers and laptops in a shared space in the home so you can monitor what your child is doing.
- Keep an open conversation with your child about what they are doing online. If they are secretive, consider taking time to talk about how to keep themselves rafe.
- Set up parental controls and privacy settings.
- If you are really worried about online safety, remember there are alternatives to smart phones!
- Don't let your child have their phone in their room overnight. This is often when they are most vulnerable. Get them to leave it with you.




